Water

The life line of a Golf Course!

A Tale of two periods, two technologies, two managements with one goal - an evergreen BGC.

Excerpts from a conversation with past captain Shantaram Girimaji, who was (THEN) member in charge of the tertiary treatment plant at BGC.

Water Management and Irrigation Challenges at BGC.

This is about our water requirements—specifically the quantum of water needed annually, especially during the intense summer months. The reason I'm bringing this up is due to the random and repeated expenditure every year.

Our total land area is about 58 acres, including fairways, roughs, and other parts. Out of that, around 1.5 acres are designated as greens. About 30 acres are not highly maintained, and their irrigation is minimal because runoff from other areas helps cover them. Effectively, we need to water about 35 acres.

Even if we add 10% to account for extra irrigation needs, the effective area remains manageable. Greens require more precision: KGA greens are about 3,000–5,000 sq. ft., but BGC are less than 2,000 sq. ft.

Sewage sourcing should be carried out without heavy investment, from nearby areas. Earlier, wells were at a distance of only about 50 to 60 feet and were well connected to the Rajnala Stream. However, sourcing sewage from that stream has become complicated due to petrol stations and other obstacles.

Previously, we used to receive domestic sewage, but it often got mixed with sewage from nearby hotels. This required the implementation of control measures and the deployment of monitoring teams. The sewage was treated through an aeration tank, which added oxygen and introduced bacteria to eliminate harmful pathogens. After aeration, the water passed through sand filters and into a 50,000-litre treated storage tank, from where it was distributed via sprinkler systems. This process is a critical part of water treatment.

Akey part of the system was maintaining proper bacterial balance. The allowed bacteria count was 21; however, when I took over, it was at 1,500—far too high. This led to health issues for golfers, like skin conditions, due to exposure to contaminated spray. We had to send samples for culture tests to confirm the contamination. Good bacteria would die if bad quality (oil contaminated) sewage came in, and it would take 3–4 weeks to cultivate new bacteria which we used to get from a lake in Lalbagh.

Only trained professionals can handle this kind of plant. We had frequent trouble with cast iron and spun pipes, which were prone to breakage and hard to repair.

Glass fragments in sewage flow once cut into the lines, making the system unusable. I documented everything, including when I was injured handling broken pipes.

The main issue now is that BGC is receiving sewage from elsewhere, and there's no clarity on who is treating it. They need two 50,000-liter underground tanks for treatment, and these may or may not be functional. The final treated water needs to pass through a UV plant with 16 functioning tubes, but only 5 or 6 were working when I inspected it. Tubes were burnt out, unavailable, or improperly maintained. Spare parts had to be sourced from Bombay, costing Rs. 2.5 lakh per set.

The plant needs a capable, accountable individual to manage it. It's not something anyone can just run—it's complex and delicate. We cannot depend solely on outside contractors.

The entire sprinkler system was automated, with one operator initiating a scan each morning to identify priority areas for watering. Not all areas need equal irrigation. But the PC board for the control system was fragile—it had to be sourced from Australia, and manual backup systems were unreliable.

We had a turning point when the course was transformed from brown to green. It started with corporate sponsorship and support from Mr B S Patil. Delegations visiting from outside commented positively, which helped garner more support.

Later, a study by an external agency estimated the volume of water we were letting flow away—about 35 lakh litres during good rainfall. That's a huge loss. In conclusion, a detailed project report must be prepared for the sprinkler system. The responsible agency needs to be identified clearly, and we must appoint a capable, knowledgeable person to manage this vital infrastructure. It's a major undertaking—but a necessary one.

Excerpts from a conversation with Dr. Sitaram Shetty who has graciously accepted the onerous responsibility of setting up a system (NOW) to ensure BGC has sufficient water for the fairways and greens throughout the year at minimal cost.

Water Storage and Sewage Treatment Project – Summary and Plan

We are working towards enhancing our water storage capacity and implementing a sustainable sewage treatment solution for the facility. Below is a summary of the key developments and decisions.

Water Storage Expansion

Current Capacity: We currently have 35 lakh litres of water storage.

Proposed Increase:

- We aim to increase storage to 70 lakh litres, effectively doubling the current capacity.
- 25 lakh litres will be added to the two existing reservoirs (currently at 18 lakh litres each). We'll raise them to around 25 - 30 lakh litres, keeping in mind the geological limitation of hitting rock, which could require costly blasting.
- An additional 10 lakh litres will be stored in a new reservoir planned beside the 13th hole. This location is favourable as it's adjacent to the planned sewage treatment plant and requires minimal work—just lining and membrane installation.
- Another 25 lakh litres of storage exists under the NCH (New Clubhouse), already measured and confirmed.

Total Storage Goal: 70 lakh litres, ensuring 7 days of water availability at any given time, even if treated sewage water is temporarily unavailable.

Sewage Treatment Plant (STP)

- Operation Timeline: The plant is designed to operate only from January to May each year, aligning with the peak irrigation requirement. It allows a 6-7 month shutdown without issues—an important feature that influenced our choice of technology.
- Electricity Cost Savings: By running the STP for only 5 months, we save significantly on electricity, which is critical given the high costs. The plant will be maintained under an AMC (Annual Maintenance Contract).
- Type of Technology: The STP is based on a compact, French-designed, odourless treatment system. One key condition in the contract is zero odour—any detectable smell will result in non-payment.
- Site Visits: We will organize visits for committee members to inspect existing installations of the same technology, including one at Cubbon Park, which has been proven odourfree.

Sewage Transportation

- Distance: Sewage will be transported over a 2.5 km pipeline from the source to our treatment plant.
- Pipeline Specification: The proposed pipeline will be 150 mm (6 inches) ductile iron (DI) pipe, which is weldable and durable.
- Routing Challenges:

Laying the sewage pipeline along the stormwater drain using ductile pipes has presented several challenges. As an alternative, we propose using a Ditch Witch to install 220 mm diameter ductile pipes beneath the footpath, with inspection chambers placed at intervals of 25 to 30 meters. This method is cost-effective and enables the transportation of sewage water to BGC by laying 2.3 km of ductile piping—well within the budget approved at our S.G.M.

Cost and Budget

- **Sewage Treatment Plant:** Approx. Rs. 7 crore
- Pipeline and Initial Treatment Infrastructure: Approx. Rs. 2.5 crore
- Total Project Cost: Rs. 9.5 crore
- The budget is within manageable limits, and we will ensure the project stays within this estimate.

Site and Aesthetic Improvements

- Parking and Landscaping:
 Once the pipeline and treatment infrastructure are laid, parking and landscaping (including flower beds) will be developed simultaneously to enhance the overall visual appeal.
- Rock Excavation: A section of the parking area sits atop solid rock.
 Since blasting is not feasible due to nearby structures, we may opt for chemical excavation—though costly.

We are also evaluating a well located near the drain, which could supplement our water supply if the quality is acceptable after treatment.

Once the final permissions are in place and the project is greenlit, we expect to move forward rapidly.

Most suitable technology for BGC is SBR (Sequential Batch Reactor)

SALIENT FEATURES OF SBR

Batch process

- Can handle fluctuating flows, best to adopt for seasonal variable discharge
- Can handle varying water quality
- Can handle shock load (varying influent parameters)
- Suitable for smaller plants
- Automated process and minimal intervention
- Less space compared to conventional process
- Economical Process compared to conventional and advanced process
- Less labour requirement compared
